

**10.4.8** Food Truck:<sup>6</sup>**A.** Permits Required.

1. All food truck operators and/or designee shall obtain a Temporary Use Zoning Permit. The permit is good for 1 (one) day.
2. In addition to payment, a food truck operator and/or designee must complete an application that includes signature, date and requested attachments.
3. Food truck vendors must provide documentation of approval from the Health Department of the County in which the food truck's associated restaurant or commissary is located.
4. The County Health Permit must be displayed during hours of operation.
5. Food truck vendors must provide General Liability Insurance for \$1,000,000.
6. Food truck vendors are allowed 1 (one) permit per calendar week, per vendor (Sunday-Saturday). No more than 2 (two) active at a time.

**B.** Public Safety.

1. Temporary connections to public utilities are prohibited.
2. Grease and wastewater must be contained and disposed of in an approved grease receptacle located at the associated restaurant or commissary.
3. If the food truck is operating after dark, the food truck vendor shall provide appropriate lighting.
4. A food truck vendor shall not operate the food truck as a drive-in window.
5. Food truck operators shall provide at least one trash receptacle for customers.
6. Food truck operators are responsible for proper disposal of waste and trash associated with the operation.
7. All equipment associated with the food truck, including trash receptacles, must be within five (5) feet of the food truck.
8. The Zoning Enforcement Officer may engage in zoning enforcement or prohibit/suspend a food truck vendor's operations if they are causing parking, traffic congestion, or litter problems either on or off the property where the use is located or such use is otherwise creating a danger to the public health or safety.

**C.** General Location Requirements.

1. Unless participating in a private event, food trucks may only operate in areas zoned Commercial or as approved in the application for special events. In all cases, documented permission from the property owner is required.
2. Food trucks shall be positioned at least 150 feet from the customer entrance of an existing restaurant during hours of operation, unless the vendor provides documentation that the restaurant owner supports a closer proximity.

3. Food trucks shall not block parking spaces, drive aisles, access to loading/service areas, or emergency access and fire lanes. Food truck vending must also be positioned at least 15 feet away from fire hydrants, any fire department connection, and driveway entrances.
4. No more than two food trucks are permitted as a Temporary Uses, unless at an approved special event, market, festival, or an active construction site. A Special Event Permit would be required.
5. Hours of Operation. Food trucks must cease operations between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m., and are not permitted to remain on site overnight.
6. Signage. No signage shall be allowed other than signs permanently attached to the motor vehicle. An easel sign no more than 12 square feet per sign face in display area may be placed within the customer waiting area.

#### 10.4.9 Panhandling / Begging

##### A. Definitions. Panhandling, Begging

1. Continuing to solicit in close proximity to the individual addressed after the person to whom the solicitation is directed has made a negative response, either verbally, by physical sign, by attempting to leave the presence of the person soliciting, or by other negative indication;
2. Blocking the passage of the individual solicited; or
3. Otherwise engaging in conduct that could reasonably be construed as intending to compel or force a person to accede to a solicitation.

##### B. Prohibited Acts. It shall be unlawful for any person to beg, solicit, or panhandle, as defined in subsection (a), above:

1. By accosting another, or by forcing oneself upon the company of another;
2. Within 500 feet of any financial institution;
3. Within 50 feet of any bus stop, train station, or taxi stand;
4. Within 500 feet of any commercial establishment which is open for business;
5. While the person being solicited is standing in line waiting to be admitted to a commercial establishment;
6. By touching the person being solicited without that person's consent;
7. By blocking the path of a person being solicited or blocking the entrance or exit to any building or vehicle;
8. By following the person who has been solicited after that person has declined the request or walked away;
9. By or with the use of threatening, profane, or abusive language, during the solicitation or following an unsuccessful solicitation;
